


The journey will be supported and supervised by a faculty member. The final paper will be presented at the annual departmental seminar. Through the course of our lives, we inhabit and occupy multiple spaces, and our experiences within these spaces are influenced, to a greater or lesser degree, by the characteristics of that space. Similarly, as we interact with spaces, we also shape their characteristics, attaching varied kinds of associations and meanings with

spaces. It is through the trajectories of inquiry within sociology and anthropology, that we focus on questions of power, structure, stratification, cultures, etc., along with the questions "why" and "what".


Space and spatiality, thus no longer remain passive receptacles for our experiences but







become active participants in them. These interactions with spaces thus further shape how bodies move, are marked, surveilled, policed, or liberated within different spaces. Thus, spaces become repositories of social, political, iconic and symbolic power. Through this theme, one can explore these dimensions of space, and understand multidimensional interactions between spaces, power, identity, and structures. ituate the social, cultural, economic, and political factors that lend character to certain spaces.



Within this theme, student-researchers can explore questions of ownership of space, and the contestations and conflicts that have arisen out of the quest for ownership. Right from colonisation, and conflicts over land, to the occupation of cultural and political spaces, as individuals and as groups, space and ownership become interesting elements to explore. This also leads to the question of the public and the private, and how spatiality mediates access to privacy for people from varied identities.

Numerous theoretical approaches also lend themselves to this analysis. Theories of symbolic interactionism; Marxist works on private property; multiple theories on space and gender, or space and identity; theories of the state, colonial, and postcolonial theories, and ethnographic work on land ownership; theories of urbanism and ruralism, and explorations into urban and rural sociology from theorists like Lefebvre, Harvey, Wirth etc.; theories on leisure, etc. could be applied to these analyses.
